

What the staff at St George's do

In the last two to three years, I have been asked a number of times to publish an organizational chart of St George's. This is to address confusion about the roles of various staff and volunteer leaders at the church. I realize that the problem is complicated and needs more than just an organizational chart.



Different Cultural Preferences

Like wider society, St George's is a melting pot of cultures. Culture is like water to fish (if we know what fish think!). Fish are not conscious of the fact that they live in water. Similarly, we hold our cultural values at a subconscious level. The added complexity is that cultures are constantly mixing and changing. So generalizations about cultures should be tentative. It is important to know that what we prefer, believe to be right, etc., may be influenced by our culture.

Within one church family, we have members from a 'hierarchical' culture and others from an 'egalitarian' culture.

Hierarchical cultures appear highly structured. In these cultures, titles, rank, and status are extremely important to authority. 'Command and control' is often how decisions are made.

Members expect the leader to generate ideas and often see their responsibility in the group as following decisions and instructions from the leader.

Egalitarian cultures, on the other hand, appear more informal and 'flat'. Titles and rank are appeared less important. Members of the culture expect to be consulted in the decision-making process and will often act independently of decisions and instructions from the leader.

At St George's, titles and rank are important in some congregations but irrelevant to others.

What We Are Called vs. What We Do

What we are called (rank and title) may tell others what we do (the office, role, or function) but sometimes they don't.

For example, Dr. (医生) is a title and a role/function. If we consult a Dr. (医生), we expect them to be able to help us with a medical problem. However, this is not always true.



Not all Dr. (医生) will be able to help us with our specific medical problem when we visit a specialist hospital. A gynecologist Dr. (医生) will have medical knowledge but will not be able to help us if our specific medical issue is cardiovascular. For cardiovascular issues, we need the help of a cardiologist Dr. (医生). That is, in some contexts, the title (Dr. (医生)) is different from a function.

Furthermore, not everyone with a role in a hospital would be a Dr. (医生) or require medical qualifications. The head of a hospital is often not a Dr. (医生). It may be helpful for them to have knowledge of the practice of medicine, but the area of competency required for their role or function is medical and business administration.

In our experience, title is the same function at the general medicine level, e.g. at the local family practice. In a more complex and specialized context, e.g. at a hospital, function may not follow title.

My observation is that the above might explain many of the confusions at St George's. We are used to the idea that the title of a staff Rev/Pastor (牧师) is the same as the function. We expect someone called Rev/Pastor (牧师) to do all the things that a Rev/Pastor (牧师) does, which is to attend to all aspects of our spiritual health and the health of the church. This would include preaching, teaching, chairing meetings, working on rosters, pastoral care, visitations, counseling, administration, decision-making, etc. So it's very confusing when someone with the title of Rev/Pastor (牧师) does not have one of these functions e.g. preaching. Or if someone without the title of Rev/Pastor (牧师) has this function.



From Medical Center to Hospital

Many of us experienced St George's as a medical center, with the Rev/Pastor (牧师) as our primary medical provider. In this context, the Rev/Pastor (牧师) is a general practitioner.

Over time, St George's has grown in numbers and complexity and has become the equivalent of a medium-sized hospital. For the proper function of St George's, new and specialized roles and offices must be adopted, e.g. children, youth, administration, teaching, pastoral counseling, etc.



Rev/Pastor (牧师) will need to move from being good generalists to good specialists. And some of the functions of Rev/Pastor (牧师) may be more appropriately staffed by specialists who may not be Rev/Pastor (牧师).

Furthermore, there is often a season of transition, where the leaders of ministries function as generalists and specialists. The context that the Lord has given us may require changes in our thinking and expectations.

My very first exposure to baptism when I was young growing up in The Netherlands was of newborn babies being Baptist in church by the pastor. I wasn't aware that children and adults could also be baptised at their later stage in life. I found this out personally when my colleague was getting baptised before getting married to my best friend way back decades ago.

Though, I was brought up with the teaching of the church at a young age at primary school and first few years of secondary schooling in The Netherlands, I was not sure what does getting baptized really meant. I always thought of the newborn getting baptized with water over their head,



a means of cleansing and being blessed by the church. But I always had that vivid image of baptism of newborns crying out loud when the water scooped up by the pastor landed on their head. Funnily enough, going from a full circle of life, I have yet again been reminded that baptism bares no age restriction when I saw the news of the passing of the former late great Australian Labor leader and Governor General, Bill Hayden. He only got baptized recently in his late life, at the age of 85, which took me by amazement. As it was the first time, I have heard of people being baptized that late in their life as a possibility.

We quarreled at work. We quarreled at home. For a long time the relationship between me and my wife was much tensed. We even contemplated divorce during several fierce fighting. At that time I was feeling really down. I didn't do well with my work and did not feel love and closeness when I came home. Then I suddenly thought of my good friends Tom and Tim and their journey of becoming Christians. That had inspired me. I spurred my wife by suggesting may be we go to

church to listen to the principles they preach and see whether there is any chance that our tensed relationship could improve. Our sons naturally went with us to attend Youth Sunday School. As our whole family went to church together to learn more about the Gospel, we all had gained a lot. From 2019 we consistently attended church with no interruption. Originally I was a Buddhist but I could not change my pessimistic attitude and feeling of despair. As a result I didn't



live a happy life. I just wanted quickly finish my life journey. My long term low mood had made my physical health worse and worse. That led to a sudden surge in my blood pressure. I couldn't control my body. I lost my balance and ended up in hospital for emergency treatment. Fortunately it was a minor stroke. When my life was no longer at risk, I had physiotherapy and rehabilitation and stayed in hospital for a month.

During the first two days in hospital, out of the blue a Christian minister came to pay a visit. Thinking back now, this is a set up by God. 





C. Upcoming repair and maintenance project:
